EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bhag Singh Khalsa College for Women, Kala Tibba, Abohar began its journey in the year 2001. An affiliate of Panjab University Chandigarh, the college has become a synonym with women education and women empowerment in the rural belt of Malwa region of Punjab. Working under the spiritual guidance of Sikh Philosophy of "ਸਰਬਤ ਦਾ ਭਲਾ" (Sarbat Da Bhala) - Welfare for All, makes the mission a lot more holistic. It made its humble beginning with an undergraduate stream of arts. The progressive journey is evident today as the college boasts with many new undergraduate courses in the streams of science, commerce, computer science and library science. In addition to undergraduate courses, post graduate courses in the subjects of Punjabi, History, Hindi and Sociology are also being taught.

The curriculum of the college is primarily designed by the Panjab University but some of our faculty members do contribute towards the same in their capacity as members of the Board of Studies of Panjab University in different subjects. Students are provided additional exposure to knowledge through seminars / workshops / group discussions and guest lectures. It also remains our endeavor to make students optimize their learning and knowledge through computer and internet. We encourage them to access internet as frequently as they want to update their knowledge. In this respect the library of college is rendering valuable services to the students. As a result of quality education and proper grooming, the college has given many assets to the society.

The college is the most favoured educational destination for girl students of the city and adjoining areas. Known for its excellent academic results, the college pulls the best of students towards itself who in turn contribute to its academic excellence. The prime aim of the college is to ensure quality education through teaching learning and evaluation. It can be achieved only through transparency in admission process starting from form distribution to display of merit list; details regarding the admission process (i.e., admission schedule and merit list of selected students) are displayed on the college notice board. The college strictly follows the recommendations of the admission committee constituted as per Panjab University norms and reservation policy of the Government of Punjab. The process is reviewed annually and improvements are implemented (e.g. making the whole process computerized). Students from backward and disadvantaged sections of society are encouraged to apply through the provision of seat reservation in all subjects for SC and ST students, other benefits include relaxation in cut-off mark percentages at entry level for SC and ST students against their reserved seats, direct financial support in terms of scholarships to SC, ST, OBC, minorities, single girl child, LIG and merit-cum-means.

At present, the college has a regular Principal and 47 faculty members. Out of these 23 are regular Assistant Professors and 24 are temporary. Out of 23 permanent teachers, 7 are Ph.Ds. All departments of the college take introductory classes to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice. The college, being a women institution, sensitizes its students on gender issues in addition to the environmental issues through its curriculum, celebrating national/international days, organizing awareness programmes, sensitizing through seminar, symposium, drama, quiz competition etc.

The faculty of the college is encouraged to participate in orientation / refresher courses, seminars, workshops and conferences (National / International) so that they may enrich their knowledge and improve their standing as teachers. Many teachers have doctorate in their respective subjects. A few others are pursuing it. The ambience of this college is student friendly to the core. They are free to consult their teachers as and when they feel the need of the same. Class tests, assignments, project work and seminars are used as supportive strategies to make the teaching and learning a more fruitful exercise. Few of our faculty members act as resource persons at various seminars, extension lectures regularly. The college has one seminar hall.

The college has active NSS unit, Red Ribbon Club (RRC), NCC wing, Youth Welfare Society for organizing different extension and outreach programmes around the year. NSS unit organizes workshop/ seminar/ discussion/ awareness programme/ sensitizing programme around the year. Many NCC volunteers have won prizes and received recognitions for their active participation in the state as well as national level camps. The students from NCC cadets are also getting employment each year in various departments of armed forces.

To ensure high quality education to the students, the college provides best possible infrastructure facilities in the campus. The college is located in serene atmosphere, in an area covering 26 acres. Apart from regular class rooms, labs, multipurpose hall, recreational lawns and other amenities, facilities are provided for sports activities like Basketball, Gym, Yoga and Indoor Games. The college is situated in an area which has been deprived of education in the past. The campus has many buildings which include well lighted, ventilated and spacious classrooms, laboratories, administrative offices, academic departments, staff rooms and fully air-conditioned computer labs. The computer labs are equipped with latest computers and Wi-Fi facility. The college has a hostel, tuck shop and canteen, common room, seminar hall and flats for the staff. The college has NSS, NCC units and an EMA Department which arranges cultural activities. The sprawling lawns and vast playgrounds lend magnificence to the physical infrastructure. For the upkeep and maintenance of infrastructure, the staff and the students take utmost care. If required, some additional workers are hired on contractual basis. The campus beautification committee insures that the campus

remains pollution free and green. To keep it healthy and eco friendly, burning of dry leaves and polythene bags is prohibited on the campus. A visiting doctor attends to the minor medical needs of the staff /students. In coordination with other academic support units on campus, the library caters to the need of students and staff of all the streams. The impressive collection of books, journals and other library material provides resources for learning, NLIST facilities to access the e-books and e-journals. Internet facility is available for library users. ICT rich environment is being further developed to encourage students to become more focused in their learning. CCTV cameras are fixed at all the strategic points on the college campus. The college has intercom system that connects all the departments internally.

The strength of the college stands in its infrastructural facilities that are evident in the form of transportation facility, a fleet of 30 odd buses which makes commuting for students and staff an easier task to even in the remotely located college. The continuous water supply is ensured. Power backup system is available in the form of UPS and generators. There are two generators (one with the capacity of 25 KVA and one with 62 KVA) as a backup for the hostel and the college respectively. Solar lights have been installed at different places in the campus. Computer enabled learning is essential in the present scenario, so the computers are upgraded and new configurations are introduced from time to time. The campus has Wi-Fi facility for the convenience of the students and the staff.

The mission of the college is to impart holistic education to girls of the rural area from all sections of society. To cater to the needs of the students, the college publishes its updated prospectus annually with all requisite details needed by students. Considering the socio-economic status of the students, various scholarships are given as Sports Scholarship and Endowed Scholarship. The deserving candidates are recommended by the respective departments. The SAF is the main fund that benefits many backward and economically backward students.

The Career Guidance and Counseling Cell of the college guide students for participation in various national and international competitions etc. The Career Guidance and Counseling Cell in collaboration with outside agencies organize series of programmes to guide the students for participation in various competitions, entrepreneurship, professional skills learning etc. Routine medical care to hostel residents is given. Adequate opportunities are given to the students to develop their skills i.e. computers, printers, scanners and LCD Projectors. For slow learners motivational lectures are organized. Individual counseling by heads of the departments and class teachers is carried out. Educational and Historical Trips are organized.

The college magazine Chintan is published annually and it serves as a platform for the exhibition of the creative potentialities of the students. In addition to this, the institution encourages and develops entrepreneurial skills among the students by creating awareness among them through career counseling, seminars, conferences, workshops and debates. They are motivated to take part in cultural and extracurricular activities like sports, games, social services etc. College students have achieved many meritorious positions in the various sports competitions at university level, state level as well as national level. Students of different departments are involved in various academic bodies in form of the societies that are active in college. These societies constitute a fine blend of students and teachers.

The college is led by the Management Committee, constituting chairperson as its patron along with various office bearers and members. The college principal in consultation with management committee and staff develops and deploys various policies and action plans. The existing processes are efficiently managed; improved and prospective plans of development are chalked out through participative management involving the critical stakeholders. Students are nurtured as per the needs of society and industry. Proper two-way communication is ensured at all levels of management. Feedback is generated and analytical mechanisms contribute to further development, analysis of strengths and weaknesses and help assess plans for further growth. The faculty is empowered for continuous development. More members are encouraged to take on research oriented activities and set goals to facilitate higher learning. Performance of individual members is assessed and carrot and stick approach is followed as and when required not ignoring the appreciative work done by faculty. Welfare schemes are also brought into effect.

The college being a self-financed institution manages its budget and gets internal audit done to bring transparency in financial matters and ensure smooth supply of funds while making provision for optimum to maximum utilization of available resources.

The IQAC takes care of academic audit and help assuring quality at all levels of institutional working.

Our college is open to all the innovative and progressive ideas and programmes to improve the ability of its students by exposing them to the latest and the best material available in the field of knowledge. It has achieved benchmarks and is always engaged in renewed endeavor to achieve newer benchmarks.

The institution is a torchbearer in innovations and best practices. It lays greater emphasis on environmental awareness. Every measure is taken to reduce the consumption of energy. Solar energy is harvested, water is optimally used and efforts

are made to reduce the emission of carbon. These include paper less work in the institution and less stress on printed material. The same is also ensured by minimizing the burning of bio products and separately treating the non-biodegradable waste. We have nothing hazardous except polythene and we have taken initiative to make polythene free campus. In the same lines, the college has an operational STP. Plantation drives are a regular feature of the college. NCC and Youth welfare society remains consistently engaged for increasing flora in the campus.

The innovative techniques for admission, research consultancy, governance and teaching methodology are a huge success. These aim at providing the maximum benefit to students out of available resources. On the spot admission and filling of other documents and use of ICT enabled class rooms are the innovative practices.

There are two best practices of the college. The first one aims at bringing rural girls to the door steps of college for learning, as college transportation works on no profit no loss basis. The second is the environment sensitization that takes place through installation of solar lights, STP and planting of saplings on regular basis.

SWOC ANALYSIS

Strengths

- ❖ The strongest point with us is that we have an opportunity to serve rural belt of the region, the access of higher education has not become a reality for most of the people especially women, in the area. The institution feels proud, as about 2000 students of 160 villages of rural area are taking education annually.
- ❖ Transportation is the pillar of the strength of any institution. The college is basically set up to provide quality education to girls from the rural background. Most of the students come from the nearby villages. The main hindrance in the way of their education is the distance and safety. In order to provide maximum access to students of these areas, the college started transport facility. The scheme is extended to staff members also. This facility save time of the students, provide better atmosphere and safety to girls. The parents also feel relaxed as their wards are secure. The bases are sent on festival/ functions and students are also secure if they are late. The college has 30 busses in its fleet. The buses go to 160 villages daily.
- ❖ The college takes prides in having an experienced and highly qualified faculty which continuously strives for excellence in academics and other co-curricular activities. The teachers continuously guide the students, teach them and counsel them. The personal relationship that is established between the teachers and students help them to better their own score and maintain a congenial atmosphere in the college.
- ❖ The college has an excellent infrastructure consisting of big and airy well lit classrooms, Computer Labs with Wi-Fi facility, Physics Lab, Chemistry Lab, Home Science Lab, Fine Arts Lab and a Music room. The college has a seminar hall and audio-visual classrooms with multimedia facility, gymnasium with latest equipments and fitness machines, well stacked library, two staff rooms, two large playgrounds, spacious lawns, canteen and a Stationery Shop on its campus.
- ❖ The college publishes an annual multi-lingual inter-disciplinary research journal "Gyan Chetna." It has an Editorial Board that reviews the research papers before sending them for publication. It has an Advisory Board that advises the Editorial Board time to time. The college also publishes an

- annual magazine "Chintan", in which individual/collaborative writings of the students are published to promote research culture among them.
- ❖ The college has eco-friendly campus with lush-green lawns. Plantation is the regular feature of the college. The college is making every effort to make the campus green and the use of non-degradable materials is discouraged. As a step towards energy conservation, the campus has been fitted with solar lights. Clean drinking water fitted with water purifiers have been installed in the college. Two high capacity silent generators have also been installed to meet with power cuts.
- ❖ The college has one hostel located within the premises, equipped with the best and modern amenities necessary for a comfortable living. There is a recreation hall fitted with LCD's where students gather for evening prayers and assemblies, recreation, playing table tennis, badminton, carom board etc. The hostel ensures services of a medical practitioner daily in the evening to provide first aid and cure minor ailments. Apart from that, the hostellers are taken to the concerned medical practitioners in case of emergency.
- ❖ College participates as well as holds competitions in cultural activities like Dance- classical dance, Punjabi folk dance (Giddha and Luddi), group dance general; Drama; Debate; Declamation; Music; Painting; Elocution; Poetical Recitation; Flower Arrangement; Mehndi and many other activities. Every year college organizes a one day "Talent Hunt" function in which the above mentioned activities are organized. Winners of these competitions get the chance to participate in youth festivals. Our college bagged two times over all trophies in 2013-14 and 2014-15 in the Zonal level youth festivals and remained second in 2015-16. Besides this our college won a considerable number of prizes in Inter-Zonal Youth Festivals. Our students Satwinder Kaur won gold medal in Pakhi making in Inter Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival 2015-16 held at Fatehgarh Sahib.
- ❖ Most of the students who take admission in our college belong to the weaker sections of the society or to rural areas. The college takes care of its needy and meritorious students by giving them scholarships and fee concessions. The college provides SAF to deserving and needy students. The college provides fee concession for father less girls of Rs. 3000/- for sister concession of Rs. 1000/- for SC students Rs. 600/- for physically disabled according to their degree of disability and for Sports students half

fee concession if she played at State/National level and EMA students Rs/-1000. Besides, we offer a book bank facility to our needy, deserving and meritorious students.

Weaknesses

- ❖ As a self-financed institution, the financial burden of payment of salaries for all the employees falls on the college. The institution has not received any special grants or finances from the university, UGC, industry or any other beneficiary agency. Due to constraints on the financial resources available, the college administration does not make a specific budget allocation for research. The college is making sincere efforts to got permanent affiliation and expecting to receive funds from various funding agencies like CSIR, UGC, DST etc. in 2016 so that separate budget will be earmarked for research.
- ❖ As the college is situated in the remote area, despite all efforts we have not been able to attract too many companies for campus placements.

Opportunities

As the college is not getting any grant/fund from outward sources, it is total relying on its own collection of money. In future if the college gets success to achieve any further aid, then the planning will be as under:

- Construction of new air-conditioned and modern Auditorium.
- ❖ Library facility for hostel will be developed.
- ❖ To strengthen e-resources in library.
- ❖ To build more class rooms.
- * Research centres to be developed in physics, chemistry, social sciences and languages.
- ❖ To build language lab and math lab.
- ❖ To construct AC reading hall in the hostel.
- To develop smart class rooms.
- Strengthening departmental libraries.
- Improvement in gymnasium facilities.
- ❖ To organize on-campus faculty enrichment programmes.
- ❖ To create more Industry-Institution linkages.
- ❖ To enhance the quality of its outreach programmes.
- ❖ To provide more scholarships to the students from socially and educationally marginalized sections of the society.

❖ To organize workshops on Self Defence, Soft Skills, Personality Development and Health and Nutrition.

Challenges

- ❖ Socially and economically backward students with low aptitude in language and quantitative skills.
- Conservative thinking of the parents who resist the higher education of girls.
- ❖ Due to mushrooming of colleges in the field of technical and professional education there is fall in strength in courses such as B.Sc. and PGDCA in the past few years. We must strive hard to increase the strength in these courses. We also need to explore new areas and introduce new courses to cater to the job market. For this, we need to introduce more Innovative/Interdisciplinary /Add-on courses.
- Developing soft skills among students.
- ❖ To meet the increasing demand of students in respect of infrastructure and latest technological tools with limited financial resources.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objective of the Institution and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers and other stake-holders.

Vision

S. Bhag Singh Hayer Memorial Trust envisages the needs of the society and is committed to stand upright with its vision towards "Empowering Rural Women" through integrated education for their social upliftment and to prepare them to excel in leadership and functional roles in the society.

Mission

- ➤ To create awareness among rural folk for coming out from vicious circle of illiteracy; thereby uprooting the centuries old dogmas of the masses of not allowing their girls to have their share of education.
- ➤ To create a congenial environment this facilitates the rural masses to come forward for motivating their daughters to expand horizons of thinking through education.
- ➤ To foster learning environment by giving them exposure of multi and interdisciplinary domains.
- To nurture the creativity of staff and students and enabling them to adopt out of the box thought, so as to mark their presence at national/international level.
- ➤ To offer such a platform to the students, wherein they feel comfortable to preserve their tradition and culture and on the same fostering the global competencies, so as to strike a fine balance between yesterday-today and tomorrow.
- ➤ To instil a sense of scientific temperament-guided towards skill development, but with thrust on human and social values i.e. social science, so that science facilitate the society and not for endangering the cultural and social foundations.
- ➤ To foster the pursuit of holistic grooming of the students viz-a-viz exuberance in the areas of academics, sports and co-curricular.

> To enable and facilitate the staff and other stake-holders to deliver in tune to vision of the trust/college.

Objectives

- > To stand committed for holistic development of rural girls, guided towards laying robust foundations of a better tomorrow.
- > To create quality pool of human resource who are enriched with requisite skill set, legacy of their culture, values, traditions and are ready for societal transformation
- ➤ To set forth a culture-where everybody aspires to grow, but not by hampering growth of others.
- ➤ On the whole to build a consortium for national character and to make our mother earth, a place to live with peace.

Communication of the Vision, Mission, Values and Objectives (VMVO)

The VMVO of the college are displayed on the college website, which is accessible to everyone. VMVO statements are printed in the 'Prospectus' for the benefit of new admissions and their parents. In the beginning of the session college faculty members visit door to door in the villages and encourage their parents to send their girls to our college, whereby they can familiarize themselves with the VMVO of the institution. In addition, these are also communicated in Hindi, Punjabi and English through daily vernacular.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plan for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific examples.

For the effective implementation of curriculum designed by Panjab University, following action plans are executed by the college:

- ➤ The institutional academic calendar is prepared by the college keeping in view the academic calendar supplied by the university.
- ➤ The tentative dates of important events, seminars, workshops, departmental activities and festival celebrations are planned.
- ➤ Before the commencement of the session, all departments distribute the subjects among the faculty members according to their expertise and same is communicated to the time table coordinator.

- ➤ In addition to permanent faculty members, temporary teachers are also appointed as per requirement for which vacancies are advertised in local newspapers and selections are made as per UGC norms by educational Management committee of college.
- ➤ To assess and evaluate the learning of the students, internal exams at college level are conducted once in a semester.
- ➤ To maintain the continuous learning, class tests/presentations/assignments are conducted by the individual faculty members.
- ➤ The internal assessment of students is awarded on the basis of their performance in internal exams, class tests, laboratory performance and discipline in the class.
- ➤ In addition to the classroom teaching, students are given exposure to new technologies and innovations by organizing science fest and tech-fest every year along with a number of seminars and workshops.
- > Sports meet is held every year at college level to inculcate the spirit of team work.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and / or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practice?

- ➤ The university provides the entire course syllabi, programs, pattern of examination, assessment criterion, list of experiments, prescribes text books and reference books which enables teachers to follow the curriculum effectively.
- ➤ Any change in the curriculum is communicated to the affiliated colleges by the university.
- Faculty members are encouraged to attend orientation/refresher courses organized by ASC of various universities.
- The college provides Wi-Fi based connectivity throughout the campus.
- ➤ Teachers stay at college till college breaks for the day. In the mean time students can approach teachers for academic problems and corridor discussions.
- ➤ For effective translation of the curriculum, the college provides resources like library, computer labs, science labs, LCD projectors and Wi-Fi based connectivity as supportive elements to teaching.
- ➤ In campus, stationary shop is housed to provide additional learning resources such as books, stationary items and general day to day items.

- ➤ To substantiate the theoretical aspects with practical applications, well equipped laboratories support is provided in the college so as to impart the practical learning.
- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency.

The college exhibits its best practices to effectively deliver the curriculum designed by the affiliating university viz-a-viz a well-knit academic policy elaborated. The faculty members who are members of board of studies of the university assimilate suggestions from the teachers and feedback from the students and actively deliberate for consideration in meetings of the board of studies and academic council.

The faculty members are encouraged and facilitated to take up membership of research bodies and councils so as to remain updated.

Based on the feedback and suggestions from the faculty members, necessary inputs are conveyed to the university through members of Board of Studies.

The college has no authority to develop its own curriculum. It implements the curriculum designed by Panjab University, Chandigarh.

- ➤ The academic delivery is carried out through well planned lectures, seminars, debates etc.
- Fair evaluation and analysis of the learning of students is done by conducting internal exams, class tests, surprise tests etc.
- ➤ Based on their performance, weaker students are categorized and extra classes are conducted for those students so as to bring a gradual improvement in students. Finally, the placement of the students speaks about different plans and its execution towards the desired results.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

At present, college does not offer any separate certificate/diploma based skill development courses. However, the students have an option to study one skill development oriented discipline course such as music, fine arts, home science etc., which are taught during all the three years of program.

The institution does not offer any program that facilitates twinning / dual degree.

The undergraduate and post graduate programs offered by the college have been so chosen to meet the key requirements of the girls in rural and semiurban neighborhood. The college offers a wide range of options, which cater to the need of students.

- ➤ Bachelor of Library and Information Science (B.L.I.S.)
- ➤ Bachelor of Arts with wide range of options from Languages, Social Sciences and Skill oriented courses etc.
- ➤ The students in Humanities stream have an option to choose subjects from Economics, Political Science, History, Mathematics, Physical Education, Sanskrit, Elective English, Elective Punjabi and Elective Hindi.

B.A. (General) 1st Year (Semester System) study programme consists of two compulsory subjects and three elective subjects:

Compulsory Subjects are:

- Punjabi OR History and Culture of Punjab
- > English
- **Elective subjects for B.A.**: A student is required to take up 3 elective subjects in all, selecting not more than one subject from any of the following sets of combinations
 - ➤ Elective English / Hindi/ Elective Punjab
 - **Economics**
 - > Physical Education
 - ➤ History / Mathematics

- Political Science
- Sociology
- ➤ Fine Arts
- ➤ Music (Vocal)
- ➤ Home Science
- Computer Applications

The college follows norms laid down by Panjab University Chandigarh so far as subject combination is concerned.

The courses available at the under graduate level are helpful to the students in terms of progression to higher studies. For this various talks / seminars/ workshops are organized to impart information regarding higher studies. The teachers at their own level also counsel the students for the same. The college is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh. The syllabus is framed by the University. It does not have the autonomy to change the time frame for any programme.

The institution does not obtain any grant from the university or government so all the courses offered by the institution are self-financed. The entire financial burden is borne by the institution itself.

The university does not allow the flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and distance mode of education. Only conventional face to face mode of education is provided by the college and the students are required to meet the minimum attendance requirement as prescribed by the university. The students are provided with the flexibility to choose the courses / combinations of their choice.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

- 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's curriculum to ensure that the academic programs and the institution's goals and objectives are integrated?
 - ➤ The objective of the institution is well defined and institution is implementing the university curriculum by inculcating value based education. In addition to the content in syllabus, guest lectures and seminars are organized to give students an exposure to meet the need of an hour.
 - ➤ The college hosts a well managed library equipped with a stock of textbooks, newspapers, quality magazines and periodicals. It also hosts computers with internet facility which is accessible to all the students.
 - Athletics and sports are integral part of the curriculum and they are organized by the institution to develop the leadership qualities and team spirit in the students. College offers physical education as an optional subject at UG level.
 - ➤ In addition to the academic knowledge, the students are provided opportunity to learn social behavior through NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club and Youth Welfare Society.

➤ The students are encouraged to participate in youth festivals to showcase their talent which helps improving their interpersonal skills and team work.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experience of the students so as to cope with the need of the dynamic employment market?

- ➤ The subject experts provide their valuable suggestions for the curriculum enrichment which is conveyed to the university.
- ➤ The feedback from the alumni is collected on the current scenario of the market and accordingly seminars and guest lectures are planned.
- ➤ Professional experts are invited to share their views and experience to the students which provides latest knowledge of employment scenario.
- ➤ Communication skills of the students are improved by conducting workshops which helps them in acquiring jobs.
- ➤ Ideas emerging from managing committee members, alumni and students are conveyed to the university for curriculum enrichment.
- ➤ The career guidance and counseling cell actively engages students to guide and counsel them for their job prospects and higher studies.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

To integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT etc., following committees are formed to take care of the students:

- ➤ Anti-Ragging Committee: The college has formed an anti ragging committee to protect new students from the harmful activities of the seniors. The committee is empowered to take severe actions against such elements; however, no such incidence has been reported so far in the college.
- ➤ Women Empowerment Cell: The college has established a women empowerment cell to address the gender specific issues and to take care of women rights and safety. The cell is chaired by principal of the college.
- ➤ A seminar on Road safety and traffic rules is organized every year in the college to expose the students to all the traffic rules and regulations.

- Environmental Studies is included in the curriculum of the university as a qualifying subject at the undergraduate level for all the streams.
- ➤ A number of campaigns on tree plantation are arranged every year in which students participate actively. Students are encouraged to plant saplings in the campus on their birthday.
- ➤ The college encourages the use of ICT in the educational programs because computer literacy is the need of the hour. Teachers are engaged to make optimum use of technology for their teaching learning process.
- > Students are made aware to globalization, culture, human rights, women safety, child labor etc. by arranging seminars in such areas which give them a chance to interact with experts from different regions.
- ➤ A number of educational and industrial visits are conducted to expose students to the industry and outside world.

1.3.4 What are the various value added courses/enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Moral and Ethical Values

- ➤ The college hosts a separate department of Moral Education in collaboration with Sri Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle. The department conducts an exam on Moral Education, on the basis of which scholarships are provided to the deserving students. The department also organizes camps and plays an important role in youth festivals.
- Assembly is conducted on any given day of the week to make students aware about moral values and other relevant aspects.
- ➤ The academic session of the college begins with invoking blessing of almighty by solemnizing Sukhmani Sahib Path in the college. Positive vibes are generated through this practice. Cultivating moral and ethical values is the need of hour. The principal and teachers through their interaction with the students share ethical and moral values.

Employable and Life Skills

- ➤ The career guidance and counseling cell provides the necessary guidance to the students regarding various career options.
- ➤ Different clubs like Youth Welfare Society and Red Ribbon Club engage the attention of students in creative activities. The students are encouraged to participate in Declamation / Debate and Creative Writing contests.

➤ The department of fine arts, home science and music actively deliberates on improving life skills of students.

Better Career Options

- ➤ The efforts are made at college level to make students capable of getting jobs.
- > Seminars and workshops enhance the level of exposure in this regard.
- ➤ NCC unit of the college prepares the students for armed and police services.

Community Orientation

- NSS unit of the college take students to the community to be aware of the problems faced by the various sections of the society. Visits to nearby villages are arranged and students educate people about need of imparting education to girls.
- ➤ NCC cadets are provided training for team work and responsible living. They are instructed in a way so that they can play a bigger role in the armed and paramilitary forces.
- ➤ The students in Red Ribbon club of the college create awareness about AIDS in society.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples, enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholder in enriching the curriculum?

The suggestions from stakeholders are appropriately conveyed to the university via members of board of studies. Their recommendations to the university meetings held in discussing the area of interest are accepted while framing the syllabus for the new session. The college teachers also share their ideas pertaining to curriculum during interaction with other teachers at workshops / seminars etc.

The college does not have any concrete mechanism of feedback the faculty members take feedback regarding curriculum in the class room and discuss in departmental meetings. The appropriate ideas and suggestions are given to university in consultation with the principal of the college and members of board of studies.

Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) is introduced from session 2011-12.

To feel the need of hour in order to inculcate the proper knowledge of financial and commercial aspects of the economy and system as a whole. To make students employable for latest job opportunity in financial sector.

Masters in History is introduced from session 2013-14 and Masters in Sociology is introduced from session 2015-16.

PG courses have been introduced in the college in the subjects mentioned above to cater to the increasing demand for higher studies.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Publicity of the Admission Process

- ➤ Before the commencement of the new academic session the prospectus is made available to the students. All relevant information regarding the admission procedure, infrastructure, fee and scholarships, various activities of the college, achievements of the students in academic as well as sports and other activities is provided through the prospectus.
- ➤ The college has its own website (www.bhagsinghcollege.com) from where students can gather information regarding the college. e-mail queries, if any, are responded promptly.
- Advertisements in the local newspapers and local channels of the Cable TV are also helpful during the admission.
- > During all important functions/programs organized by the college from time to time, the Principal transmits the same information to the audience.
- ➤ Huge Billboards are fixed at strategic points on the campus, the boundary walls of the college building, nearby the city and villages also serve the purpose.
- ➤ The team of teachers personally visits schools in the neighboring areas to publish the achievements, infrastructure, courses available and the relevant facts about the college.

Transparency in the Admission Process

- ➤ The college is built with the vision of women empowerment through the medium of education and has consistently been putting efforts to draw maximum students from Rural, Malwa, Bishnoi belt and border area where women are culturally and socially marginalized.
- From the stage of notification till the completion of admission process, the admission committee is always there for the help of the candidates. Admission registers of all the classes are prepared containing the details such as the student's name, father's name, period-wise allotment of timetable, section and pass percentage. Admissions are taken as per Punjab University rules. Reservation is as per the policy of Punjab Government.

In case any student quits the selected seat, another student in waiting list is enrolled.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Application forms can be bought from office and the spot enquiries are attended by a team of senior teachers. Selection of students to the course is based on marks obtained in qualifying exam. The college admits the students solely on the basis of merit in the qualifying examination. In case the affiliating university lays down a special criterion like Entrance test or Interview, then the college strictly adheres to it. Applications for admission to undergraduate courses are called for, according to the Panjab University calendar. A personal interview with Principal and admission committee of various streams is part of the selection process. The admission committee helps the students to make the choice of the medium of instruction and subjects. College follows reservation policy of the government also.

Depending on types of courses, the following criteria and process of admission are adopted:

- ➤ Students for professional courses like B.L.I.S., B.Sc., B.Com. and BCA are selected on merit cum first-come first- serve basis depending upon the number of seats available especially in the said courses. The students for general courses like B.A. (Arts and Inter Arts) are selected on first-come first- serve basis.
- ➤ The Admission Committee of the college guides the aspirants for professional courses to make their choice according to their aptitude and ability.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The college follows the same percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by Panjab University, Chandigarh. The prospectus lays down the minimum percentage as per university rules.

However this is determined as per the availability of candidates in merit lists and varies every academic year.

The minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college is as follows:

- ➤ A student aspiring BCA course should have obtained 40% marks and should have passed mathematics subject at matriculation level.
- ➤ A person joining the B. Sc. Course must have obtained at least 40% marks in the aggregate of the qualifying examination.
- A student joining PGDCA must have passed Bachelor degree under 10+2+3 system of examination with at least 50% marks in any discipline.
- ➤ The candidate aspiring B.A. course must have passed 40% marks.
- ➤ A student joining B. Com. must have 45% marks.
- A student joining M.A. (Punjabi, Hindi, History and Sociology) is required to secure 50% marks in her graduation.
- ➤ A candidate aspiring B.L.I.S. must have passed graduation in any stream with 50% marks.

Relaxation of 5% marks is provided to SC/ST/OBC/Physically Disabled as per the government policies.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is an Admission Committee to review the admission process and student profiles annually. Admission coordinators are appointed to facilitate the admission process. The college chalks out a plan much before the commencement of the session. Teams of teachers visit schools and villages of the area to interact with students for providing guidance and counseling.

The outcome of such an effort results in bringing about transparency, streamlining and systematizing the admission process, following up of reservation policy strictly as per provision of the government and selection of meritorious and disciplined students from the weaker sections.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion SC/ST, OBC, Differently Abled, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other

Bhag Singh Khalsa College for Women, being a women college and its objective being women empowerment, every effort is made to prepare women for their various roles and responsibilities in society. The college is catering to the needs of rural marginal communities. Relaxation of 5% marks is given to the above said categories. The admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the national commitment to diversity and inclusion by adopting the following strategies to increase/improve access for following categories of students.

❖ SC/ST/OBC/Minority

- ➤ There is a provision of Punjab Government Scholarship for them at the time of admission.
- ➤ Free books from book bank are being provided and financial assistance is provided to students from SC/ST/OBC/Minority.

❖ Differently-Abled

- ➤ The college is sensitive to the needs of the differently abled and has complied with the relevant government policies. Among manifold issues related to the educational aspects, the college takes into consideration the problems and necessities of such students.
- ➤ Before admission the counseling committee provides special attention, guidance and counseling to such student and motivates them for higher goals and education attainment.
- At the time of admission priority is given to differently abled students. Ramp has been constructed for entry to the college keeping in mind the needs of such students.
- > Timetable is set and rooms are allotted to them keeping in view their convenience i.e. on ground floor.
- ➤ Their requirements and needs are given a special attention and care by every staff member. College also provides special concessions and relaxations according to the student's needs.

& Economically Weaker Sections

- > Freeships and other concessions are available to them.
- ➤ Books from book- bank and financial assistance by Management committee and faculty members are provided to the students from economically weaker sections.

- From the session 2015-16, S. Dalmir Singh Aulakh Fellowship of one lakh is provided to economically weaker but meritorious students.
- ➤ Dr. Mandeep Singh (Veterinary) bears the fee of one deserving but needy student.

Sports Persons

Special attention and coaching is provided to the outstanding and budding sports persons. Repeaters and compartment cases are given admission and considered for fee concession.

Any Other

- Admission rules are relaxed for students who have won recognition in debates, declamations, theatre, fine arts etc. and liberal concessions are given depending on their merit.
- ➤ Special admission to single girl child is given in case of unavailability of seat in any specified course. In 2014-15 student named Oshen Saharan was given consideration under special admission case.
- Malwa belt being hit by the epidemic of cancer, the college has witnessed students who are Cancer patients. Such students are provided fee concession and also special care and attention. Keeping in view their health conditions, it is ensured that teachers cope up with their learning speed and pay special attention and guidance.

Overall trend in admission is mounting because of availability of qualified teachers, infrastructural facilities, student-centric teaching-learning process, transparent and good governance. The admission committee and admission coordinators initiate appropriate action for improvement in the admission process by:

- ➤ Making teaching and learning student-oriented and adding to infrastructure.
- ➤ Introducing new programmes keeping in view local as well as global demands.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Student.

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college makes best possible efforts to address the needs of differently-abled students. Such students are allotted their time-table in such a manner that their classes are held on the ground-floor. Students with personality disorders are counseled by the senior staff of the college. Regular counseling and interaction between students and teachers is taken up in order to provide a comfortable platform to students to discuss their problems, be it personal/academic. Cancer patients are exempted from minimum attendance requirement. Teachers help such students by giving them extra time on the days they are regular to college. Differently-abled students are provided financial assistance and helped to apply for scholarships to Panjab University and government agencies. Such students are also given extra time during terminal and final examination if required.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The institution is well aware about the needs of the students. Every class is a blend of intelligent and average students. Students are admitted with different caliber with the motto of 'Education for All'. The college ensures the availability of efficient faculty to satisfy the queries of the students. Assessment of the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme is carried by taking the following measures:

- The admission committee holds talks/discussions with students regarding their aptitude/interest and suggests them subjects keeping their aptitude/interest in view.
- ➤ The admission committee also refers student to subject experts for comprehensive advice as and when required.
- > Special attention is given to weak students and they are provided golden chance if their performance is found to be unsatisfactory during house tests.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.)

To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice, the following strategies are drawn and deployed by the institution:

- > Teachers are encouraged to identify slow learners and handle them with extra patience and care.
- ➤ Peer learning is encouraged in a sense that meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners.
- Their daily homework is checked to monitor their progress.
- > Special tests are conducted for them.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by taking the following measures:

- ❖ The college organizes seminars and workshops on such issues.
- ❖ The institution had organized a one day seminar on Human Rights in India on 08 Mar 2012 (Women Day) focusing on the following inter-disciplinary sub-themes:

 - Constitution of India and Human Rights
 - Scheduled Castes and Violation of Human Rights
 - Child Labour
 - ➤ Human Rights and Rural Area of Punjab

- ❖ The institution had organized a one day seminar on Women Empowerment on 08 Mar 2013 (Women Day) focusing on the following inter-disciplinary sub-themes:
 - Dowry System
 - > Female Foeticide
 - Domestic Violence
 - ➤ Workplace Harassment
 - Child Marriage
- ❖ The institution had organized a one day seminar on Impact of Globalization on Literature, Language, Culture and Society on 27 Jan 2016 focusing on the following inter-disciplinary sub-themes:
 - ➤ Globalization and Literature
 - ➤ Globalization and Economics
 - ➤ Globalization and Social Values
 - ➤ Globalization and Ethnicity
 - Globalization and Environment

Apart from the above endeavors, the institution regularly organizes various lectures/quiz/discussions on inter-disciplinary topics to promote research culture among students and staff.

- ❖ Women Empowerment Forum has been formed for gender-oriented sensitization.
- NCC and NSS Wings of the college sensitize staff and students on various socio-cultural issues.
- ❖ The college teachers sensitize their students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by holding talks/discussion on the current affairs regularly in their classes.
- Staff and students are sensitized on various burning issues during weekly interactive session taken up by the Department of Sociology.
- ❖ All major festivals are celebrated in the name of girls. The college celebrates 'ਧੀਆਂ ਦੀ ਲੋਹੜੀ' (Lohri for Girls) every year to inculcate feeling of equality in society among girls.
- ❖ Girls participate in kite flying festival at Basant Panchmi like boys.
- ❖ Outside groups which campaign on social issues are encouraged to visit the campus. Recently an 'ਨੁੱਕੜ ਨਾਟਕ' (Nukad Natak) titled 'ਆਖਰ ਕਦੋਂ ਤੱਕ' (Akhar Kadon Tak) against the social evil of drug addiction was performed by the members of Red Art Punjab.

❖ Students are also taken for field visits in the surrounding area so that they may connect and become aware of the issues pertaining to their own society.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies special educational/learning needs of advanced learners through direct interaction with advanced learners and on the basis of feedback of the teacher concerned. The institution responds to their special educational/learning needs by taking following measures:

- For continuous monitoring and evaluation of the students, the advanced learners are continuously encouraged to strive for higher goals for providing them additional inputs for better career planning and growth e.g. encouraging the students to be active members or office bearers of various activities.
- ➤ In order to channelize their potential to accomplish better success they are given motivational lectures so that they can achieve top most career options. Special attention is paid to encourage the advanced learners to excel and achieve higher goals. At the time of admissions, brilliant students are guided to opt for more challenging courses/subjects by the counseling committee.
- > Special books of advanced level are recommended to them.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

College authority is very sensitive towards female education so every girl who is unable to continue her studies counts personally to the college committee members. The college collects data and information on the academic performance of the students from class tests, house tests, attendance record and face to face interactions. Such data is used to make strategies to improve the academic performance of the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections and minimize their dropout rate by taking following measures:

- > Teachers supplement their lecture in regional language as well for better understanding of students.
- ➤ The college keeps in touch with the parents of such students and they are informed telephonically by the teachers.
- A number of motivational lectures are organized to channel their potential.
- Liberal fee concession and free books are provided from book bank.
- ➤ There is a provision of Punjab Government Scholarship for them at the time of admission.
- ➤ Time Table is set and rooms are allotted to differently abled, keeping in view their convenience.
- ➤ Students with personality disorders are also scrutinized by the staff and their problems are heard and also discussed with the Principal to reach a rational solution. Parents of such students are always kept in touch with. The results had always been very satisfying.
- ➤ Candidates from economically weaker section even with low percentage are accepted if seats are available.
- > Single girl child is given special attention.
- ➤ Slow learners are given special care to contain drop-out rate among them. Peer learning is encouraged amongst them. Their daily homework is checked to monitor their progress. They are referred to the counseling cell, which diagnoses their problem and suggests psychological steps, especially in cases of acute stress, depression, low self-esteem etc. Simplified versions of books are recommended to them. Special tests are conducted for them.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

All the heads of departments, in consultation with their faculty members set targets for syllabi completion before the commencement of the session. It is ensured that institution moves from easy to difficult, unfamiliar to familiar and at a pace that is easy for learners to maintain. The college follows the academic calendar of affiliated university. The same academic calendar is published in the college prospects before the beginning of the session every year. Each department functions according to the teaching plan prepared at the departmental level. Timetable is prepared and displayed on the notice board.

Towards the end of each session / semester, theory and practical examinations are conducted by the university and evaluation is carried out. The exam results are declared and score cards are issued by the affiliating university.

Teaching Plan

- ➤ Every teacher draws his/her teaching plan, broadly taking into consideration, the ability of his/her students. These plans are reviewed and rechecked, if need be.
- The academic calendar and individual teaching plans are meant for broad reference.

Evaluation Blue Print

- ➤ Oral and written class tests are scheduled weekly and at the end of the chapters or units.
- ➤ Besides these class tests, house tests are conducted internally before the final examination conducted by the university.
- ➤ The departments also carry out internal assessment based on student test performance and punctuality.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC contribute to improve the teaching learning process. It functions as an overall advisory body operating constantly for the betterment of the teaching learning process. The IQAC has been formed in the college recently on 05 Sep 2015. It conducts a meeting after every three months and tries to improve the quality of the teaching learning process. The IQAC monitors promotion, implementation and continuous improvement in curriculum, co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the college. It also works towards the enhancement of the learner's knowledge capacity and personality.

In the first meeting, certain areas were located which were required to be strengthened in college. It was found that the students needed some improvement in communicative English and computer skills so as to make them eligible for jobs. The IQAC suggested to organizing more seminars in order to spread awareness on academic and social issues. The IQAC recommended that regular parent teacher meeting department wise be started. Even the meetings of the Alumni Association should be held regularly.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Students have always been the center of all its academic and co-academic endeavors. All possible efforts are made to ensure their fullest growth and development in a safe and congenial environment. Right from the time a student enters the portals of the college, student is guided, counseled, inspired, motivated, corrected and her energies channelized in the best possible manner. The teachers promote interactive learning by striving to bridge the gap between the teacher and the taught. The college has a seminar hall where students participate in group discussions and seminars.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The college provides open access to educational and life-long learning opportunities by inculcating healthy habits like discipline, leadership, entrepreneurship etc. thereby contributing to the social, cultural and economic development of our region.
- ➤ College has a research committee which is devoted to inculcate and orient both teachers and students towards research endeavors.

- ➤ Lifelong learning is ensured by providing moral education to them through the thought of the day in the weekly morning assembly.
- ➤ The college arranges different awareness programs on topics such as women literacy, anti-dowry, environmental, health, save water, spiritual, yoga, disaster Management etc.
- ➤ The college organizes seminars, symposia, workshops, debates.
- ➤ The college arranges guest lectures, academic discourses, sports and cultural activities.
- ➤ The college library subscribes to newspapers, journals, periodicals and magazines.
- ➤ College keeps in touch with its alumni to get a feedback from their achievements. College also organizes alumni meet whereby students are also inspired by their seniors.
- ➤ The English Literary Society displays important and syllabus connected words on black board adjacent to the library to make students comfortable in English especially when students come from rural and less educated families.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The following technologies and facilities are available and used by the faculty for effective teaching:

- The college has a projector room to enhance teaching and learning skill.
- ➤ Fully AC, Wi-Fi connected library with latest books and other media, free downloading, free printing, etc.
- ➤ The college has a seminar hall which is always available to departments whereby students can give power point presentations and have interactive sessions with teachers.
- Library has subscribed N-List (e-Consortium for college library) to access e-resources.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

In order to expose the students and faculty to advanced level of knowledge and skills, the college takes up the following initiatives:

- Seminars and guest lectures are organized on regular basis by all the departments to update their knowledge. This helps them gather information about the latest developments in their fields.
- Newspapers and Internet are used on daily basis to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- ➤ The institution conducts study excursions to develop the interest of students in their respective subjects.
- Faculty is always encouraged by the research committee to attend workshops, orientation courses in-order to expose them to advance knowledge.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

The institution provides academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services. Guidance and counseling is provided to the students, both at the academic and personal level by the faculty. The process begins much before the commencement of the new session as the faculty members move from door to door and try to convince the eligible candidates and their parents regarding the importance of higher education and the benefits combine. Motivated thus, the students seek admission. They are then further guided for the right choice of the programmes/courses/elective subjects. Special emphasis is laid on personal interaction between the students and teachers outside the classroom. The teachers who teach PG classes have been allotted departmental rooms to meet the students for personal and academic counseling. The library plays an important role in this endeavor of acquiring advanced level of knowledge. To add, the college teachers really act as a true friend, philosopher and a guide for the students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The following innovative teaching approaches/methods have been adopted by the faculty during the last four years:

- ➤ Illustrations through examples or demonstrations, particularly by science teachers.
- ➤ Teachers employ collaboration to assess student's abilities to work as a team, leadership skills, or presentation abilities by conducting group projects and discussions etc.
- ➤ Quiz Competitions, Debates and Writing Competitions are conducted in the class rooms.
- > Group discussions are often held in the class rooms to discuss the pros and cons of a particular topic.
- Efforts are also made to improve the communication skills of the students.
- > Students are allotted topic to prepare Power Point Presentations and class seminars are held at PG level.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process in the manner below:

- ➤ The college library has subscribed to various printed and electronic journals related to different subjects.
- ➤ Books and magazines are purchased by the college on regular basis for knowledge upgradation.
- ➤ Newspapers and free Internet are used on daily basis to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- ➤ A separate periodical and reference section have been created in the library.
- A Book Bank has been functioning in the college, providing books to underprivileged students. The Book Bank is managed by library incharge.
- > Special help is rendered to students preparing for competitions.
- ➤ Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students by librarian.
- ➤ Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university, with question-wise division of marks etc. are also available to students for ready reference.
- ➤ The library staff keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions.
- The new titles are displayed on the library Facebook page and on recent addition shelf.
- > The information regarding new arrivals is also given through the college notice board.
- > Students are encouraged to make good use of library services. They are provided with barcode embedded library card which enables them to get books issued.
- > Teachers are instructed to take fresher's to library frequently to instill reading habits among them.
- ➤ The college library organizes events like Face-A-Book challenge and lectures to cultivate critical thinking and reading habits for students.
- ➤ A separate dedicated room is provided to teachers as well for reading.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

To hone skills and develop holistic personality of its students, the institution encourages students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and thus, faces a challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. However, the college arranges special classes of such students.

- ➤ The institution faces problem in the case of slow learners. By providing them remedial classes, the institution overcomes the problem.
- ➤ The institution has witnessed sincere dedication of its staff in catering academic needs of the students whereby teachers can usually be seen discussing and entertaining students doubts related to syllabus during their free lectures as well as corridor discussions.

The college monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through IQAC which collects feedback from all stakeholders and on the basis of such feedback, monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning. The faculty is employed strictly as per UGC and University rules and conditions. The same eligibility conditions apply on part time and adhoc faculty. The college provides pay scales as per UGC rules and security of service to the faculty and other staff who have desired qualifications, knowledge and skills. Contractual-basis appointments are made by Management. Those who are employed on adhoc and contractual basis are offered better pay scales than surrounding areas. They are continued in the coming sessions and where required the faculty on contractual basis is offered permanent employment. In some cases additional increment is also paid to a candidate with good skills and qualification.

Strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

To enhance the teaching quality, faculty members are sent to various refresher courses and capacity building workshops. Moreover teachers are encouraged to participate in National Seminars.

The institution is proving Sabbatical Leave to the faculty for doctoral level research activities. The faculty members are permitted to pursue their research and adjustments are made in time-table so that teaching does not get hampered. Mr. Vinod Kumar, Head, Department of Hindi (January to June 2015) and Mr. Neeraj Kumar, Department of Physics (June 2015 to Nov 2015) has availed study leave of six months to attend Ph.D. course work. Mrs. Megha Aggarwal, Head Department of Chemistry is on study leave pursuing Ph.D. from Panjab University Chandigarh since July 2015. However the teachers are also provided Duty Leave to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and training programmes (refresher courses/orientation courses, etc.).

No concrete methodology for assessment is followed but there is a suggestion box where the students can drop their complaints, if any. The contents of the box are analysed on a monthly basis and suitable measures taken to redress the grievances. During the term-wise meetings of departments, the feedback is analysed and passed on to the Principal.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

To ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes; the institution takes the following measures:

➤ The evaluation methods are communicated through the prospectus, notice board, morning assembly and even through announcements in the class rooms.

- ➤ The progress of the students is monitored by the teachers through class tests, written assignments, oral tests, group discussions and interactive sessions.
- ➤ If a student falls short of lectures, the parents are intimated and requested to discuss the matter with the Class Incharge/HOD/ Principal personally.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation Reforms initiated by University:

- ➤ The university is in the process of introducing semester system for all levels of all streams and subjects. Semester system has replaced annual examination method in all PG classes already.
- Table-marking has been introduced to ensure fair evaluation.
- ➤ An external invigilation system has been introduced from 2010-11 to check the menace of copying.

Evaluation Reforms initiated by the institution on its own

The college is ceaselessly engaged in improving its systems to foolproof them. Following reforms have been initiated recently in the evaluation system:

- ➤ To bring uniformity in marking scripts marked by fresh recruits, the scripts are scrutinized by seniors randomly and anomalies are pointed out to them. Special tests for advanced and slow learners are arranged.
- Assignment/Project based internal assessment is taken in UG and PG.
- Answer sheets of the House Tests are delivered to and discussed with students so that they are assured that no partiality or favouritism has crept into evaluation and, thus, they are accorded opportunity to check their total score and impartial evaluation of their answers as well.

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own through Academic Council.

Formative evaluation approaches

- > Sports Trials are conducted.
- > Students selected in Sports Trials are trained.
- > Every year an athletic meet is organised by the college.

Summative evaluation approaches

- > Students are trained for competitions at district, state and national level.
- Students participate in Athletic Meet organised by Panjab University, Chandigarh.

The college ensures complete transparency in internal assessment according to the instruction/guidelines issued by the affiliated University. The students are familiar about the internal assessment system. The internal assessment is made by the faculty members keeping in mind the following aspects / factors of students' performance during the academic year:

- > Score in the term examination etc.

Inspite of all the above aspects of the students, their behavioural aspects, independent learning and communication skill etc. are also taken into consideration during the assessing of a student.

- ➤ The college faculty instils research aptitude in the students by giving them minor projects. Students of commerce and computer science departments are assigned such projects.
- ➤ The college NCC and NSS Wings regularly organize programmes to enhance the social relevance of the courses.

The college collects and analyses the data on student learning outcomes through their attendance, performance in class tests, their participation in various co-curricular activities and finally their performance at the University examination. The students are given introduction of unit wise internal choice and objective and analytical type questions consisting of objective, short and descriptive and analytical answers. This ensures comprehensive study and understanding of the entire course contents by the student.

Research aptitude is inculcated in the students by giving them minor projects. Students of commerce and computer science departments are assigned such projects.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

Currently there is no research project undertaken by any of the teachers of the college because there is not any provision by UGC to sanction research projects to temporary affiliated colleges. However, the institution is making sincere and serious efforts to get permanent affiliation and in future if any project is sanctioned by the UGC, the institution is committed to provide full freedom to the Principal investigator and also provide adequate instruments/equipments and other facilities for conducting the research projects.

The college encourages students and other faculty to involve in research to attend conferences/workshops/seminars. infrastructure and technological tools are provided to the teachers already enrolled for M.Phil. /Ph.D. Teachers engaged in research are allowed exemption from all duties, co-academic and cultural work of the college. The faculty for members going research paper presentation state/national/international level seminar/conference/workshop are supported with duty leave and adjustments are made in time table.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution arranges debates, quiz, group discussions, mock interviews and essay writing competition on famous scientists, model presentation in annual Tech Fair, arranging popular talk, observing different important national dates related to science like National Science Day etc. to develop scientific temper among students. The classes are made interactive through multimedia projectors and students are encouraged to ask questions frankly. PG students of various departments are given projects in the form of assignments. The institution encourages the students to participate in the educational tours in different scientific institutions of the state like Science City, Kapurthala. Historical trips are organized at various places of Haryana, Rajasthan and Himachal Pradesh etc.

In order to develop research culture and aptitude among them, the students are encouraged to attend various seminars/conferences/lectures, organized by departments and other colleges of the region which provide an opportunity to

interact with eminent researchers and motivate the students to join higher education for research. The college library also motivates the students by arranging various competitions of research importance like Book-Reviews, book talks and also organizing user-awareness programmes on accessing e-resources and other latest equipments. The institution also holds various intra-college and inter-college quiz competitions based on latest research topics.

Three (3) faculty members are involved in guiding research scholars towards M.Phil. /Ph.D. programmes. 3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

The institution is proving sabbatical leave to the faculty for doctoral level research activities. The faculty members are permitted to pursue their research and adjustments are made in time-table so that teaching does not get hampered. Mr. Vinod Kumar, Head, Department of Hindi, Mr. Neeraj Kumar Department of Physics have availed study leave of six months to attend Ph.D. course work and Mrs. Megha Aggarwal has availed long leave for pursuing Ph.D. from Panjab University Campus. However the teachers are also provided duty leave to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and training programmes (refresher courses/orientation courses, etc.).

The institution has no opportunity in advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the college among the students and community. However, the awareness about research findings done by the faculty members is created among the students and community through organizing seminars/workshops, publications of seminar proceedings, publicize the findings/conclusion/views through press releases and publications in national and international journals/books.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

Due to constraints on the financial resources available and there is not any research oriented programme offered, the college administration does not make a specific budget allocation for research. However to facilitate research, the

college regularly organizes seminars/conferences/lectures and the expenditure is borne by the college from its own resources. The college is making sincere efforts to get permanent affiliation and expecting to receive funds from various funding agencies like CSIR, UGC, DST etc. in 2016 so that separate budget could be earmarked for research.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

As the college is a self-financed institution and is not capable to make a specific budget allocation for research, so it does not have any provision for providing seed money to the faculty for research. But the faculty is given study leave (with full pay) for doctoral level research activities and duty leaves and other facilities to attend seminars/conferences/workshops/refresher courses as per their requirement to motivate them for research.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

The institution does not offer any research-oriented programme. Thus students-led research projects are not introduced. The financial provisions for supporting student research project are not allocated in the annual budget. As per Panjab University curriculum, small projects/assignments are allotted to BLIS, Commerce and post graduate students. Although, no financial aid is given to the students, yet there are certain other facilities made available to support student research projects:

- > Internet facility
- ➤ Reprographic Facility
- > Free downloading, free printing etc.
- Overnight issue of reference books
- ➤ Audio-Visual Resources available in library
- ➤ Free e-books and online journals available through membership of UGC N-LIST Programme.

- ❖ The institution had organized a one day seminar on Impact of Globalization on Literature, Language, Culture and Society on Jan. 27, 2016 focusing on the following inter-disciplinary sub-themes:

Apart from the above endeavors, the institution regularly organizes various lectures/quiz/discussions on inter-disciplinary topics to promote research culture among students and staff.

The equipments are well maintained by the individual departments. The equipments and other facilities available in the departments are used by the teachers and students as and when they are needed in day-to-day classes, for research projects and in organizing seminars/workshops. The institution ensures optimal use of various equipment and research facilities by the following ways:

- ➤ Teachers guide the students when the equipments are used for practical classes.
- ➤ Library provides orientation service to new comers to acquaint them to library resources and services and also instruct them how to use OPAC. Library attendants are there to help the users to get books out from the almirahs. Current awareness service in the form of New Arrivals, Current Contents etc. is provided by library. User awareness programs are organized about the use of N-LIST programme of INFLIBNET.
- ➤ The institution also organizes digital literacy programs from time to time to train students and staff with latest technological tools and equipments.
- ➤ Need based repair and maintenance of equipments is undertaken with utmost responsibility.

As per the curriculum issued by the affiliating university, the basic infrastructure is available for the under graduate students. As the strength of students increases in the institution, Management itself procures new equipments as per the requirements. Moreover, recommendations are sought from the departments on requirements for infrastructure. The institution

ensures periodic updating and upgradation of the infrastructure and equipments.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

With the donation of 26 Acres and an amount of 2 Crore by our honorable Chairperson Bibi Harbaksh Kaur in the fond memory of her husband Late S. Bhag Singh Hayer, the college was established in 2001 with a strong infrastructural policy. The management of institution has outlined the policy to create and lift up the infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning to the students and more particularly girls in the rural area. The management has a positive approach for the development of Infrastructure facilities and offers funds for the development as per the need. The infrastructure facilities were created with an objective of developing an institution that can offer better facilities than the colleges in the surrounding area for effective teaching and learning processes.

The college has built up excellent infrastructure and learning resources over the last fifteen years of its existence. Its campus of 26 acres has a large two storey building that accommodates the administrative office and the academic departments, lecture halls, library, science laboratories, Fine Arts and computer laboratories.

The campus accommodates a hostel and three flats for teaching faculty (only for female) and six quarters for class IV employees. A large part of the campus is a sprawling garden with trees, ornamental plants and flowers. The grounds, lawns and gardens are beautifully and aesthetically kept. The maintenance is entrusted to staff that are conscientious and committed and a maintenance coordinator supervises their performance. The classrooms are spacious and well ventilated. The laboratories are well equipped and carefully maintained. There is an adequate facility for the students to perform all the prescribed experiments and do project work. Apart from this, the college has also two large sports grounds and a Girls common room.

The facilities are being regularly upgraded as per the requirements of the departments. For the creation and development of facilities, the college follows a policy such as:

- Every department analyses its needs every year for the next academic session.
- > The departments calculate the estimated cost and prepare proposals.
- There is separate purchase committee in the college.
- ➤ This proposal is discussed with the concerned purchase committee in the presence of the principal.
- Committee approves or disapproves the proposal and sanctions the budget if required.
- Any purchases for development activities are carried out in a systematic manner by calling for quotations, calling purchase committee meetings for technical and commercial negotiations etc. before the final procurement.

We take pride in the extension activities carried out by our volunteers under NSS.

* NCC

The students are motivated at the beginning of every academic year to enroll them for NCC (Army Wing). A special room has been set up as the office of NCC with the essential equipments like almirah, table, chair, notice board etc. The NCC unit of the college is attached with 2 Punjab (I) Coy NCC Abohar stationed in DAV College and the unit was raised on May 3, 1977.

> Field Activities in NCC

Drill, Map reading, Weapon Training, Field Craft, Battle Craft, Minor Tactics, Role of Infantry, First Aid, Hygiene and sanitation, Civil Defence and Leadership Training Adventure Training are taught regularly. Activities like Tree plantation, Blood Donation, Awareness rallies (AIDS, Corruption) Cleanliness. Annual training Camp, National Integration Camp, Army attachment Camp, Republic Day Camp, Thal Sena Camp, Trekking Camp, Basic Leadership Camp are organized with zeal. Cadets are prepared for certificates "B" and "C" of NCC.

Cultural Activities:

College participates as well as hold competitions in cultural activities like Dance- classical dance, Punjabi folk dance (Giddha and Luddi), group dance general, Drama, Debate, Declamation, Music, Painting, Elocution, Poetical

Recitation, Flower Arrangement, Mehndi and many other activities. Every year college organizes a one day "Talent Hunt" function in which the above mentioned activities are organized. Winners of these competitions get the chance to participate in Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival. Our college bagged the two times over all trophies in 2013-14 and 2014-15 in the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival and remained second in 2015-16. Besides this our college won a considerable number of prizes in Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival. Our student Satwinder Kaur won gold medal in Pakhi making in Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival 2015-16 held at Fatehgarh Sahib.

- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? College has adequate infrastructure for various academic activities. It has 25 class rooms, many laboratories, seminar hall and multi-purpose hall. While preparing time table, students are divided in various sections, appropriate number of students are allocated in each section. The classrooms are optimally utilized. Labs are also used as classrooms if and when free to utilize them optimally. Two projectors are installed one of which is portable.

- ❖ Master plan of the college is attached herewith application form.
- Present physical infrastructure of the college:

- The college is spread over an area of 26 acres to the eastern side of the town. Established in 2001, the college has huge complex comprising separate blocks for Arts, Sciences, Commerce, Physical Education, Computers, Administrative Block, Library, Canteen, Staff-room, NSS, NCC etc. It has one hostel, which is enough for occupants.
- > There is one music room cum lab in the college.
- For students, there is a common room to provide them healthy and constructive atmosphere. It has been provided with various facilities to enable the students for their all around development.
- ➤ The college has a vast network of infrastructure facilities considered essential for the academic growth of the students.
- ➤ The library is equipped with 7791 books, subscribed to 28 Journals/periodicals and 14 newspapers. A. C. fitted reading room is the pride of our college library. The functioning of the library is fully automated.
- ❖ One hostel with cooperative mess facility makes students stay comfortable in the campus. The hostel is large and spacious, located in the eastern side of the college, having college campus in front of it. It has grassy lawns in front as well as inside it. The hostel has the following infrastructural facilities:
 - ➤ 44 rooms sufficient enough to accommodate 150 students.
 - ➤ 24 hours water and power supply.
 - A mess with a dining hall (40 students capacity at a time)
 - A common room with LCD, indoor games and newspapers.
 - A cold drinking water arrangement with RO in hot summer.
 - ➤ A guest room to accommodate parents.
 - ➤ A dispensary to treat minor ailments. A Registered Medical Practitioner (RMP) is available.
- ❖ A big canteen caters to the students as well as to the staff members.
- ❖ One generator of 25KVA ensures continuous electricity supply even during the long power cuts.

Future planned expansions:

As the college is not getting any grant/fund from external sources, it is totally relying on its own sources of finance. In future if the college gets success to achieve any further aid, then the planning will be as under:

❖ Hostel Facility – Accommodation available

- ➤ Keeping in mind that "Hostel is a Home Away from Home", hostel facility is provided within the college campus. There is one hostel. The hostel is meant for undergraduate and post graduate students though students are accommodated as per their number and requirements. There are 44 rooms, 3 flats for teaching faculty, 1 office for warden, 3 rooms for mess workers and 3 stores apart from a terrace and a lawn measuring 2401 sq. feet. The hostel is housed in 11844.99 sq feet area. The rooms open up to porch areas and balconies in both the hostels. The hostel has well lit and properly ventilated rooms with wardrobes, study tables, chairs and beds.
- ➤ The hostel has a dining hall with seating capacity of 40 students at a time during meal timings. The mess areas are properly kept clean, ventilated and include kitchen, store rooms and spaces for workers. The hostel inmates are provided pure drinking water. There are separate RO plants (with capacity of 50 lt.) in hostel. Water and electricity is maintained regularly through bores and generators. The hostel has equipped with coolers.
- ➤ The hostel is managed by one warden, two helpers, one peon and other supporting staff that includes watchmen, sweepers and attendants.

* Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga center, etc.

- ➤ The recreation is provided during evening assemblies, outdoor sports facilities are provided through sports incharge and hostellers can continuously practice in sports ground. There is provision for indoor games like table tennis, carom board, badminton etc. Two parties are organized every year. One to welcome fresher's and second to bid farewell to seniors and these throw open a platform to hostellers to exhibit their talents. Apart from this small events are organized from time to time.
- ➤ The hostel subscribes to three newspapers (one Hindi, one Punjabi and one English) and magazines for re-creation and other books can be borrowed from the college library.

❖ Computer facility including access to internet in hostel

Students are allowed to carry their personal laptops.

***** Facilities for medical emergencies

The first aid kit is available in the hostel office. The hostel staff ensured services of a medical practitioner as and when required. Apart from that, the hostellers are taken to the concerned medical practitioners in case of emergency. The college utilizes services of two renowned doctors Dr. Upasna Loona and Dr. Parmjit Singh of the area for the same.

\Delta Library facilities in the hostels

In evening hours hostlers are allowed to use library facilities in the presence of hostel attendant.

* Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments

There is a common room fitted with LCD where students gather for evening prayers and assemblies, recreation, TV watching, playing table tennis, carom board etc.

Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy, constant supply of safe drinking water

There is a provision of residential facility for staff along with offices for Wardens/Asstt. Wardens to work. The college has three flats- one room set (single room, kitchen and bathroom) for teaching faculty (only for female). Constant supply of water is provided through submersible and its connections. A water tank of capacity 40,000 liter is installed in the college campus to insure regular supply of water.

Security

The whole hostel premises are safe and secure. There are grills, high walls and barbed fences to ensure safety. Apart from physical facilities, two security guards (day/night) are posted regularly. There is one man to ensure safety during the day and another during the night. Apart from that attendants are available throughout the night and remain on the premises.

Students are provided medical assistance as and when required. Medical facility is provided to Hostel Residents on daily basis. A medical practitioner visits hostel from time to time. Medical check-up camps for all students are arranged every year and reports are sent to the respective department for necessary follow up. In case of symptoms of severe illness, parents are intimated immediately.

 - Grievance Redressal Cell: Grievance Redressal Cell exists in the college and meetings are held in the principal office. A feedback is taken from students. Suggestion box has been installed in the campus for the students. Best suggestions are rewarded. Counseling of the students is done and their grievances are redressed on personal basis.
 - ❖ Women Cell: Women Cell organizes various activities like seminars, workshops, guest lectures, talks to sensitize the students on gender issues.
 - ❖ Career Guidance and Counseling Cell: Career Guidance and Counseling Cell exists in the college. A number of seminars/workshops are organized to make the students aware of the job market, its demands and latest trends. The students are groomed and trained to write a CV and face an interview etc. Recruitment drives are organized in the college campus regularly and students get selected in the various companies.
 - ❖ Recreation Centre: The college has a spacious and a well maintained Recreation Centre. The quality of the food and the rates of various eatables are supervised by the canteen committee. The kitchen is regularly inspected for cleanliness and the canteen committee ensures that healthy

and hygienic food is served to the students. A tuck shop is available to cater to the daily needs of the students especially those living in the hostels. Indoor games are provided in the hostel common rooms. Also gym facility is there in the college. The common room of the hostels are fully equipped with, LCDs, music systems etc.

- Outdoor sports facilities are provided through sports incharges whereby students can continuously practice in sports ground. There is provision for indoor games like table-tennis, badminton, carom board etc. The library subscribes to many newspapers and magazines for re-creation and other books can be borrowed from the college library.
- ❖ Safe drinking water facility is available in the college. Water coolers with water purifiers are installed in each block of the college building. Constant supply of water is provided through submersible and its connections. As water from water works department is inconstant, a water tank has been installed in the college campus to ensure supply of water

- ❖ The computer faculty is always available for any need based assistance in the use of ICT.
- ❖ The faculty is encouraged to use power point presentations for delivering lectures and technical talks.
- University internal assessment is updated online.
- Student admission process is automated.
- ❖ Barcode embedded identity cards for the students and staffs are provided by the college.

- ❖ Internet access to all faculty and students helps them to access journals, e-learning material available in other universities and make use of the same for knowledge enhancement.
- ❖ YouTube videos are used by the faculty members to demonstrate lectures.
- ❖ In the departmental seminars delivered by students, they are encouraged to use latest methodologies for their presentations.
- Various online tests for the placements are conducted from time to time for the students by various companies like Wipro and Aspiring Minds Institute.

The Purchase committee and the Bursar watch over the optimal utilization of Budget allocated for various activities. The procedure for budgetary allocations is well drawn out involving the Management, Principal, Bursar and the Respective Heads of the concerned Departments, Purchase Committee and the Accounts Department. During the Annual Budget meeting, the budget is allocated for various activities.

- ❖ General Fund is used for paying water and electricity funds, arranging college functions and meeting the expenditure incurred on furniture fixtures, etc.
- ❖ The revenue generated from the hostel is used for the upkeep and maintenance of the hostel.
- Student Welfare Fund is used for the general development of the students/ prizes/ scholarships, etc.
- Amalgamated Fund is used for books, seminars and sports. It is used for the construction and maintenance of the buildings funds. These are also used for the promotion of sports and other organizational activities.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has a vast network of infrastructural facilities available for its staff and students. There are employees on permanent and contractual basis who maintain the infrastructure of the college. The additional technical assistants /helpers for up keeping, cleanliness and maintenance are also hired on need basis. Any repair and renovation work is also suggested by the committee and action is taken after the approval of the committee.

Eco Club: Eco club members plant saplings during the rainy season. The hard work of the sweepers and the creativity of the gardeners are the reason behind the well maintained lawns, athletic tracks and garden/courts for various games. The maintenance and repair of the infrastructure is taken into account by the college on regular basis in a systematic way.

- The staff under the supervision of concerned Heads regularly maintains the laboratory equipments.
- ❖ The internal stock verification and audit of the various departments is done on regular basis.
- The library also keeps check on the books issued, returned, damaged or to be weeded out.
- The upkeep and maintenance of the computers/ labs is a continual process.
- Plumbing, electrical fittings, repair of furniture, cleaning of water tanks is also carried out whenever required by maintenance department

The annual maintenance of the equipments in all labs is done during the summer vacation every year. The technical and non-teaching staff is engaged in this activity and they ensure that all equipment are functioning well and also seek external expertise if needed during the period. This ensures that teaching-learning process is run smoothly in all aspects throughout the year. The stock verification is also done during the same period to help identify the non-working equipments and suggest necessary replacements. Regular cleaning and upkeep of the equipment is overseen by the faculty members who are the in-charges of the laboratories. The annual budget and allocation of funds and regular monitoring of utilization of funds for maintenance ensures upkeep of the infrastructure in the college.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

- ❖ The calibration process is taken up by each department for various equipment as per the time frequency suggested by the supplier. Historical data of each equipment is maintained in the labs where in the measured values are compared with earlier measured data and also with the standard values. Any deviation in this regard is noted and necessary steps are initiated by calling the technicians from the supplier.
- ❖ As and when the instrument breaks down, it is repaired. Every year at the time of stock taking, committees are formed each and every equipment/instrument is checked and if it is found beyond repair then it is written off.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, up keep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- ❖ The generators available in the college help in continuous power supply without any hindrance.
- ❖ The computer systems and other sensitive equipment are provided with UPS systems so that power failure does not cause any damage.
- ❖ All precautions are taken to protect the precision equipment by providing voltage stabilizers and individual MCB's. Covers are provided where-ever needed to keep the sensitive equipment in dust free environment.
- ❖ Continuous water supply is ensured through a Water Tank, containing the water of water supply, 5 bore-wells available in the college and 5 RO systems at different segments of the college, three in college premises, one in hostel and one in guest house.

There is a caretaker in the college who is responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the building and electricians, plumbers, technicians and overseers are appointed as per the requirement. The computers in the computer department are maintained by the staff or help is sought from external agencies. In the Fitness Centre, equipments are looked after by the staff appointed for its maintenance. The college uses its own funds to maintain its infrastructure.

Students to participate in various competitions / National and International

To motivate the students to participate in various competitions, the college provides transportation and lodging facilities in the hostel when ever required. College appoints coaches in addition to physical education department faculty member to provide them necessary training.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

There is no health centre in the college. The college has first aid box with physical education department for emergency and local health practitioner is invited whenever necessary. The students and staff get purified drinking water. Occasionally, yoga competitions are also organized.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

College does not organize any coaching classes for competitive classes. College provides them computers with internet facility, competitive magazines and books in the library to prepare them for competitive exams.

Skill development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy etc.)

The college regularly conducts Personality Development Programs which enhance the IQ level and communication skills of the participants. The college also invites guest speakers from the industry who provides regional and global employment opportunities to the students. Special classes are taken for communication skills taking into consideration the rural background of the students. Detail of programs and lectures as follow:

- One day seminar "Zet king" was conducted by Mr Rajesh on 17 Dec 2010 on the theme of computer hardware.
- ❖ One day seminar "Goldfish" was conducted by Mr. Sanjeev Chugh on 18 Dec 2010 on the theme to handle the software techniques.
- ❖ A two day workshop "Joomla" was conducted by Mr.Deepak Goudth for skill development of the students on 19-20 Nov 2011.
- One day personality development program was organized by Nature Way on 02 Dec 2014.

Computer department every year organizes IT fest with various events (Logical Test, PPTs, Debugging, Typing, Quiz competition, IT Antakshari, Spelling Test, Tech walk, Skit on computer topic, Stalls from the student on computer working models, Chart making, Rangoli etc.) for the computer students so that they come to know the importance of computer literacy and the applications. College students also took part in the inter-college IT fest on 19 Dec 2011.

Support for "Slow Learners"

Majority of the students of this college belong to rural background. In the beginning of the session faculty members identify such students and the college organizes remedial and tutorial classes frequently for slow learners. Slow learners are also identified at departmental level and special attention is paid to them in addition to the remedial classes.

Exposure of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house etc.

The college recognizes the importance of providing proper exposure to the students, particularly those hailing from nearby rural areas. Students are also encouraged to attend national and international seminars and workshops conducted by various colleges. Guest lectures by eminent resource persons are organized to help the students come to know about the recent developments in their respective fields.

Publication of student magazine

The college publishes an annual magazine "Chintan" which provides opportunity for the students to express their thoughts, creativity and it serves as a platform for the exhibition of the creative potential of the students. The college magazine is printed under the supervision of the college Editorial Board. All the sections of the magazine have staff as well as the student editors. The staff helps the students chisel their writing and creative skills.

The college has made concrete efforts to facilitate entrepreneurial skills by adding value added courses like Home Science, Fine Arts and Music. The faculty of commerce conducts interactive sessions to develop entrepreneur skills by providing information on self employment and local entrepreneurs are invites to interact with students. These efforts result in developing interest among students how to establish their own enterprise.

Working outside the classroom with diverse groups of individuals, provides the students with opportunities to gain self-confidence, self-regulation and appreciation for differences and similarities.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

As majority of students belong to rural area, the college feels pleasure to motivate such students towards participating in cultural activities, higher studies and sports. As strength of each class is average, so teachers can easily guide students personally from time to time. Teachers make student aware about various competitive exams. The college has a dedicated career guidance and counseling cell.

<u>Academic:</u> Staff members regularly counsel students as well as their parents specially to motivate them and to make them aware about values of higher education so that they must think over providing higher education to their daughters belonging to rural area.

Personal: Students are always encouraged to discuss any of their queries about their overall development with teachers. Teachers interact with students personally from time to time. Development courses, various trips and educational tours etc. are organized for holistic development of the student.

<u>Career:</u> Students get guidance about their career from teachers whenever required. Guest lectures are also organized on departmental level to make students aware about various streams and placements. Faculty members provide counseling to the students about subject of their choice mostly at the time of admission time.

Psycho Social: At psychological level teachers interact with students to make them psychologically strong in addition to the morning assembly on weekly basis where principal interact with students to boost their moral. On social front the college conducts various functions and activities wherein students socialize with each other.

<u>Moral Education:</u> The college has collaborated with Shri Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle to empower moral education and inculcate moral values among the students.

The college has a career guidance and counseling cell for students in which students are given guidance relating to their career and higher education. The college contacts with various companies or sometimes students are routed to other colleges for placements. College organizes various workshops, seminars and skill development programs to facilitate student progression.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

It has been observed that certain major factors affect the students to discontinue study and dropout.

- Most of the students belong to rural area. Students are unable to meet the expenses for higher education.
- ➤ Playing the role of a bread winner, where students work to support their families.
- Most of the students belong to rural area. On few occasions, certain typical socio-economic phenomenon and marriage prevent some students from continuing their studies.
- ➤ In rural areas, lack of awareness and conducive facilities lead to the drop out and risk of failure.

The college tries to solve these problems in a proactive manner. Financial support and incentives are provided to the needy students in several ways. Teachers try to motivate family members for continuation of their studies of their wards. Students who get married while pursuing their studies, college give some relaxation in lectures so that they can continue study. For students who are bread winners of the family, college take a humane approach in dealing with those students and interact with them continuously and try to help them.

- ➤ Participation of cadets of NCC in many national camps and parades on National occasions fosters zeal of patriotism.
- ➤ NSS contribute to the social welfare by participating in mandatory camps and sensitizing others through awareness programs.
- > The students continuously bagged prizes in zonal festivals in most of the events.
- ➤ Regular practical for science and seminars at PG levels are organized.
- ➤ Field trips, excursions at UG and PG level and general awareness programs on religion, environmental issues, road safety, AIDS awareness through Red-Ribbon Club. The college lays emphasis on keeping and compiling records of students, provides ICT facility on request, provides free browsing facility in different blocks and has well equipped labs and seminar halls.

***** Teaching and Learning:

- ➤ Consistent efforts are being made to make teaching learning student centric by involving them in projects, seminars, debates, writing competitions, presentations etc.

- ➤ Emphasis is laid on faculty improvement by organizing seminars, conferences, workshops, extension lectures and encouraging teachers to attend such programs.

***** Research and Development

- ➤ The spirit of innovation and experiment imbibed by the institution propels research and development.
- > Teachers are encouraged to attend seminars/ conferences/workshops.
- ➤ Eminent scholars/researchers are invited to deliver extension lectures for the benefit of students and teachers.
- ➤ Computer facility with internet has been provided.

Community Engagement

- ➤ The college believes in strengthening ties with the community, be it parents, professionals, general public or the less privileged citizens.
- ➤ College engages many organizations such as NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club and Youth Welfare Society for holding extension lectures to develop the relationship with the community.

***** Human Resource Management

- ➤ The faculty undergoes various training and development programs in terms of seminars/ workshops/ interaction as resource persons, orientation and refresher courses.
- ➤ The poor and needy students are helped by faculty, given concession in fee structure.
- ➤ College has facility of Book Bank for the needy students.
- ➤ The meritorious students are guided to avail various scholarships and other benefits. They are also given fee concession

❖ Industry Interaction

➤ The college interacts with various institutes and consults them on various issues for the improvement of education system.

- ➤ Youth festivals are being held by college to interact with other colleges. In past, the college has hosted Zonal Youth Festival in year 2007 and again in 2011.
- ➤ College has also participated in various cultural programs held at various places. Seminars, workshops, conferences on various subjects are conducted in the college premises.

Grievances Redressal Cell

Overall well-being of students and personnel at the campus is an important concern and therefore mechanisms to address and redress grievances are maintained through a proper procedure.

- ➤ The principal is accessible to share the concern of any member of teaching / non-teaching staff.
- ➤ Parents share their grievances with the teachers with the intervention of the Principal.
- ➤ A separate hostel committee is formed to redress the grievances of hostellers / staff / mess contractors or parents.
- After analyzing the problem, corrective actions are initiated.
- ➤ There is a separate cell for redressal of grievances of women employees and students. This cell continuously advises girls in various matters, resolves issues and takes up their problems to the leadership and institutional head that is accessible to share their concerns all through the year.

❖ Gender sensitivity

Since college is a women college, even a minute issue regarding students and female faculty is taken into consideration and timely corrective measures are taken.

- ➤ The college does not have a concrete form feedback system, but at the end of every session teachers take feedback from students.
- > Such feedback is analyzed and principal provides personal counseling to teachers who are freshers or face emotional problems for better functioning.
- ➤ Teachers also collect information from time to time through personal interaction and pass it on to the authority for changes and betterment in handling of curriculum, infrastructural facilities and student support services.
- ➤ Teachers personally interact with the students and outgoing students are encouraged to give feedback regarding the shortcomings in the previous session and they are asked to share their experience in college during their stay both regarding hostel as well as in respective departments.

- ➤ The employees are motivated for their roles and responsibilities by appreciating them through circulars and staff meetings and ensuring their co-operation in various committees.

Other means to evaluate the performance of the teachers is through the results of their students in the university examinations, feedback from the passing out students, parents and heads of the departments and conveners of committees.

While granting increments, placements in higher grades etc., due consideration is given to the Appraisal report. The staff members are encouraged to improve upon the points where they are lagging and excellent achievements of the staff are given due recognition.

- ➤ The principal and the management play an important role in the performance appraisal of the staff.
- ➤ Upgradation of pay scales is done on the basis of the performance appraisal reports.
- ➤ Continuation of service of temporary /contractual staff is also based on the review of performance appraisal.
- ➤ Performance appraisal meetings are held by the management committee with members of the faculty where academic results of the institution are discussed.
- ➤ The management committee gives guidelines for improvements which help in the growth of the institution.
- > Special achievements of the staff members are lauded by the principal and the staff in the staff meetings.
- Achievements of the students and the staff are recorded in the prospectus and college magazine "Chintan."

- > Friendly greetings on occasions.
- Refurnishing of cabins and departmental rooms.
- ➤ The college provides transport to some teachers who commute from Fazilka, Malout and nearby villages.
- ➤ There are residential quarters for non-teaching employees also. The college provides water services as well.
- > Uniforms are distributed to drivers.

- ➤ The institution accords fair treatment to faculty in terms of sharing of administrative responsibilities.
- > Service rules are employee friendly.

- A selection committee is formed before the interviews and it has representatives of management Committee and staff besides subject experts and the principal.
- ➤ The college even offers good salary to adhoc qualified faculty.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- ➤ The college has evolved a mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available resources.
- The fee structure is as per university norms.
- > Salaries are deposited directly in accounts.
- A teacher from commerce department of the college has been appointed as a Bursar who authenticates all the financial transactions of the institution.
- ➤ Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations are called for and prices are compared.
- ➤ The financial resources of the college are managed in a very effective and foolproof manner.
- ➤ The principal in consultation with Bursar monitor the financial flows by formation of different committees like purchase committee, for managing functions/activities organized by the college.
- ➤ The regular expenditure in any head is monitored at various levels like staff member committees, college bursar, the college principal and the managing committee of the college.
- ➤ Concerned departments at first make a proper demand in writing for the requirements of apparatus, equipment, repair etc. to the principal. The bursar and the principal scrutinize the application and direct the office concerned to invite quotation of reputed concerns/ companies/ suppliers. On getting quotations, these are analyzed by quality and finance experts and finally purchased upon sanction from the principal. After that other formalities are completed like stock entry and the records are maintained.

The accounts of the college are regularly audited. The bursar scrutinizes and authenticates all the bills/vouchers and cash books. He ensures that the proper purchase procedures are followed before every payment. The college has appointed a chartered accountant, who regularly audits the college accounts.

The decisions are taken only after considering various aspects and discussion with its members regarding any new change introduced to enhance the quality of the persisting system.
- ➤ Dr. Navjit Kaur and Mrs. Sonika Narang are two external members included in the IQAC.
- > Students contribute to its effective functioning by proper feedback and suggestions.
- ➤ Alumni members meet head of institution and the college utilizes such intellectual resources.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. Various committees like library advisory committee, EMA committee work according to the quality policy of the college leading to achievement of the vision of college to produce true and noble talent. The academic quality is ensured by organizing seminars, sending teachers for training, supporting students for excellence in university merit, providing internet and library facility and recruitment of quality teachers.

The college work towards effective implementation of quality assurance procedures because the quality improvement of both teaching and non-teaching staff would ensure the enhancement of quality in every field. Whenever, the college introduces a new course, Panjab University sends a team of experts for conducting the academic audit. They also suggest further changes or improvements that can be made for its betterment. All the major recommendations of the inspection committee are taken into consideration. Library is enriched, qualified and eligible candidates are selected, equipment is purchased and other recommendations are also implemented.

Since, UGC has prescribed the minimum number of working hours. Our time table committee makes sure that all teachers get their workloads accordingly. The stay of teachers, promotions are after fulfilling UGC criteria. All the internal quality assurance mechanisms are aligned with Panjab University, Chandigarh.

The institution has the following mechanism to review the teaching learning process.

- Attendance is compulsorily taken in each lecture and lecture shortage is calculated (if any) for students and discussed with their parents for its maintenance from time to time.
- > Syllabus are completed well before the exams to ensure class preparation and practice
- Assignments are given to students in subjects where required.
- > Students are given training in practical labs.
- ➤ Needy students are given special attention.
- > Feedback from students.

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- ➤ Some teachers of the college have done B.Ed. and M.Ed. in which the teaching learning process was basically in their curriculum.
- > Principal's interaction with staff and students.
- > Plan for online evaluation.
- > Reviewing of performance of committees.

The faculty and the principal discuss the problems with the various committees and IQAC which render their help through their valuable time and suggestions which could take the institution to newer heights. The policies are communicated to management, alumni, parents and staff during different meetings and interactions.

The college has adopted many innovative ideas and new practices to add on to the academic excellence. The college always lays greater emphasis on the environmental awareness and to make the students and society knowledgeable about various issues. The college always strives to equip the students and the campus with the latest technology for the better understanding.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The eco club of the college periodically conducts green audit to keep the campus green and eco friendly. Tree plantation is a regular practice of the college.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- Energy conservation
- ***** Use of renewable energy

- Check dam construction
- **&** Effort for Carbon neutrality
- Plantation
- ***** Hazardous waste Management

The college is undertaking many steps for making the campus and its surroundings eco-friendly. So far following measures have been taken in this regard:

***** Energy conservation

The building of the college is such that there is no use of artificial lights during day time. The class rooms have windows with glass panes that allow natural lights in the rooms. Students are instructed to switch off fans and lights before leaving the class rooms. All the equipments in the labs, administrative office are such that they consume less power. The CFL and LED lights are used in the college as well as in the hostel. In the hostel LED is used instead of conventional TV and monitors. The unit settings for all the ACs are 22-24°C.

All the computers, UPS and printers are closed when not in use. All the PCs are used in power saving mode.

Use of renewable energy

The college has installed solar lights in the campus which keeps the campus and hostel lightened during night time.

❖ Water harvesting

The college is situated in the area which receives little rainfall. So, the water harvesting cannot be adopted.

Check dam construction

There is a water tributary flowing nearby but it is situated in the residential area so dam cannot be constructed.

& Efforts for carbon neutrality

As carbon generation is the main threat to the environment today, the college realizing the importance to neutralize the carbon generation undertakes the following steps:-

- ➤ Plantation of trees is done regularly by Eco Club, NCC and NSS units to neutralize the generation of carbon.
- The electric notice board is used to minimize the use of paper.
- > The printers and other gadgets in the administration office are such that these emit less green house gases.
- ➤ The students are encouraged to make their notes themselves so that the usage of photostat machines can be minimized.
- The college is declared as no smoking zone.
- > Generators are properly tuned and service is done regularly.
- > Sufficient number of dustbins are placed in the campus and there is ban on the burning of waste material.
- > Students are encouraged to use both sides of the sheets so that the use of paper can be minimized.

Plantation:

➤ The college through its NCC and NSS unit plants a large number of trees in the campus as well as in the surrounding areas in which the camps are held.

- To create consciousness and awareness among the students and people living in the neighborhood villages, the NSS, NCC unit, youth welfare Society are playing a vital role. This has been done by organizing lecturers, seminars, Slogan writing competitions, poster making competitions etc.
- ➤ Tree census is done periodically. All the young and mature trees are counted and numbered. If any tree gets damaged due to storm or any other reason, the replacement is done immediately.
- ➤ Sufficient number of display boards have been put in the campus to educate the students about the benefits of clean environment and making them aware

***** Hazardous Waste Management

With the change in technology and life style, there is an increase in the use of hazardous waste materials and other non-biodegradable materials. The following steps have been taken to overcome the problem of hazardous waste management

▶ Ban on polythene and other non bio-degradable materials:

Students are encouraged to use paper bags or fabric bags. Students are advised and motivated not to use such non bio-degradable materials.

- Sufficient numbers of dustbins are kept at each floor for the safe disposal of all the waste material.
- Use of polythene is banned in the college campus.
- Drive against fast food has been initiated in the campus and the dead food like noodles, burgers etc. are creating health hazards and endangering our present generation.

& E-Waste Management

E- Waste is not a problem in our college. It only exists in the form of old and used CDs, DVDs, printer cartridges and that too in a very small quantity. Use of CDs and DVDs is discouraged and instead use of e-mail and pen drives is encouraged. The printing cartridges are resisted till they become non-functional.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

During the last few years the college has taken many innovative steps for the smooth functioning of the college. Some of these are as follows:

Innovation in Teaching Learning Process

- > Use of multimedia projectors in class rooms teaching.
- ➤ A number of audio-visuals, physical demonstration, simulation and animations are used in classes.
- ➤ N-LIST database subscribe for access of e-resources.
- ➤ Barcode embedded identity-cum-library card.
- ➤ E-LIBSYS, library management software is used for routine functioning of library.

Innovation in Infrastructure

- ➤ Bio-metric attendance machine is installed for the faculty members.
- Electronic notice board is installed for general information.
- ➤ Noiseless electric generator is installed.
- > Buses are equipped with GPS and Cameras.
- ➤ The administrative office is fully computerized and air conditioned.
- The library is made fully computerized and air conditioned.
- > CCTV cameras are installed at various places in the campus.

Innovation in Admission Process

- Admission process is computerized with the dedicated software BALL by MACWILL.
- ➤ Counseling of parents and students is done by admission committees at the time of admission.
- > Students belonging to weaker sections of the society are allowed to pay fee in easy installments.

Innovation in Environment

➤ A dedicated Eco club for environment consciousness is formed which conducts green audit and tree census regularly.

- ➤ An innovative practice of plant saplings on birthday of students has been introduced in the college.
- R.O. water is utilized for watering purpose.
- ➤ Use of renewable energy sources is encouraged which is evident from the installation of solar lights.

Innovation in Student Welfare

- A book bank facility for needy and deserving students.
- A book donation box has been kept to serve the purpose.
- > The same practice is operational at departmental level also.
- ➤ Fee concession for various categories like fatherless child, differently abled, Sister, Weaker section, academically meritorious, Zonal and Inter Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival winners and Sports achievers.
- A donation box is installed in the library by YWS in which staff and students contribute money to financially help the needy students.
- ➤ Dalmir Singh Aulakh scholarship scheme is introduced to give annual concession of Rs. 1, 00,000 to needy and deserving students. Under this scheme 10 students are given an annual scholarship of Rs. 10,000 each.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no. 98, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and / or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

The college has adopted various practices for the improvement in its quality in the terms of education, facilities to students and to equip the students with the ability to face the challenges of modern life. Some of these practices are mentioned below:

Best Practice - I

Title of the Practice: Avail transport facility- Let distance be no hindrance.

❖ Goal:

The college is located in the rural area. The college is basically set up to provide quality education to girls from the rural background. Most of the students come from the nearby villages and suburb area. The main hindrance

in the way of their education is the distance and safety. In order to provide maximum access to students of these areas, the college has started enough transport facility. The scheme is extended to staff members also. This facility saves time of the students, provides better atmosphere and safety to girls. The parents also feel relaxed as their wards are secure. The buses are sent on festival/ functions and students are taken care if they are late.

***** The Context:

Most of the students come from the villages situated far away on Sitto Road, Fazilka Road, Sri Ganganagar Road and Malout Road. The buses cover 160 villages daily. A very small section of the students opt for hostel. The girl students cannot come themselves from the far away villages on private transport and even parents are reluctant to send their wards alone in the insecure atmosphere.

***** The Practice:

The college has 30 buses in its fleet. This venture is extremely popular among the parents, staff and students as it provides a safe and secure travel, avoiding wastage of time. The buses are kept in well maintained condition and are equipped with GPS and Cameras. The drivers are employees of the college and are wholly accountable to the principal. Their behavior and demand is constantly observed. There is an incharge who constantly keep an eye on all the matters related to the transportation. Any problem faced by students regarding the halt of buses, time of halt and change of timings due to change in time-table or some event or activity in the college are attended to, solved and alternate arrangements are made. The numbers of students are as per the seating capacity of the bus. Fare turns out to be nominal and benefits maximum.

***** Evidence of Success:

This scheme is much successful and the parents and students feel satisfied. In each session, routes of the buses are decided according to the strength and need of the students. Transportation being USP of the college which is a major factor in bringing girls to door steps of the college.

Problems encountered and resources required:

There have been no major problems encountered so far. However, a few minor problems that may arise are resolved at the earliest. This practice requires infrastructure, human resources and lot of investment. The college is spending a heavy amount on the purchase of buses, salary of drivers, maintenance and fuel cost.

Best Practice - II

Title of the practice: Increasing Environment sensitivity, environment protection, cleanliness and plantation.

❖ Goal:

The world is facing many problems with regard to environment such as global warming, emission of green house gases, depletion of ozone layer etc. which poses a major threat not only to the present generation but also to the future generations. The college considers environmental issues on priority basis and takes the responsibility not only to educate the students about the syllabus but also to make them aware about the issues related to environment pollution, so as to protect themselves as well as do a bit for the coming generations.

***** The Context:

In order to achieve the goal, the college is making every effort to make the campus green and the use of non bio-degradable materials is discouraged. The college makes every effort to make students realize the gravity of the situation and also aims to provide a better atmosphere for studying. The college also makes the students aware that they can contribute a great deal to control the pollution, save the environment and society directly and indirectly. The college, through seminars, campaigns, lectures, workshops and display of boards relating to environmental sensitivity invokes the feeling of self responsibility among the students and staff so that they can contribute in the big cause.

***** The Practice and evidence of success

The college with the help of Eco Club, NSS and NCC carries out the tree plantation regularly in the college. These units organize lectures to make the students aware about green and clean environment. The practice of tree plantation has achieved a huge success and the "ਅਜੀਤ ਹਰਿਆਵਲ ਲਹਿਰ"(Ajit Haryaval Lehar) contributed to it by planting trees in the campus. The college

administration also contributes by restricting the sale of plastic bottles and other stuff. The eco club conducts green audit and tree census regularly. Also, the prevalent practice of plating saplings on birthday of students has generated a curiosity among students towards environment conservation. Water conservation is ensured by utilizing R.O. waste water for watering purpose. Also, the use of solar lights in the campus is an initiative towards use of renewable energy. This practice generated a sense of belongingness among the younger generation and their concern for clean environment. Tree plantation has contributed to the beauty and greenery of the campus besides affecting carbon neutrality in the campus. The CFL and LED lights are used in the college as well as in the hostel. In the hostel LED is used instead of conventional TV and monitors. The unit settings for all the ACs are 22-24°C. All the computers, UPS and printers are closed when not in use. All the PCs are used in power saving mode.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Although, this practice being a huge success, still a few problems are encountered as no grant is received for the campaign. There is difficulty in creating the interest of the students in the campaign, as the college is located in the rural area. There are many resources required for this campaign such as active participation of the students, funds etc. In spite of the above mentioned challenges the practice has proved to be a success.
